## FOREWORD

The very first issue of the annual *The Mountaineer* sets a characteristic tone of exuberance, describing the founding of the club, the planning for the initial Summer Outing into the Olympic Mountains, and the story of that adventure, culminating in the first ascent of the West Peak of Mount Olympus, highest point in the range.

In following years one reads of other Summer Outings, many of them also notable explorations of Northwest wilderness, of shorter trips into closer-to-home hills, of the evolution of scrambling into genuine climbing, of the introduction and popularization of skiing, of the pioneer ascents of the unknown giants of the North Cascades, and of much else, including the steadily more important efforts of the organization to "preserve the natural beauty of Northwest America."

With the passage of time, *The Mountaineer* has become a central resource for studies of the recreation and preservation history of the region. Its usefulness, however, has been limited by the lack of a comprehensive index. That fault has now been repaired by Anita Nygaard, who devoted innumerable hours of painstaking effort to preparing these listings. Students of Northwest mountaineering and conservation are in her debt.
